## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The Central Academy for State Forest Service (CASFOS) Burnihat under the aegis of Directorate of Forest Education (DFE), Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, took a step ahead of its mandate and conducted a three-day training programme for the Teachers & Students of Eco-Clubs and Educational Institutions from 12<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> December, 2023 on the theme “Conservation Education” as part of Training of Other Stakeholders programme. The Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Government of India sponsored this training under its Environmental Education Programme (EEP) and hence this training programme on the theme of “Conservation Education” for the Teachers & Students of Eco-Clubs and Educational Institutions was planned and organised. The training was conducted in offline mode. 41 participants from 2 States i.e. from Assam and Meghalaya participated with overwhelming enthusiasm in this training programme.

The National Green Corps (NGC) popularly known as “a programme of Eco-clubs” is a nationwide initiative of the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change launched under the Environment Education Awareness and Training (EEAT) in the year 2001. The scheme is being operated through Eco-clubs of 25-30 students having interest in environment related issues, formed in member schools. Eco clubs are supervised by a Teacher In-charge, who is selected from among the teachers of the member school.

The Course was inaugurated by the Shri Rahul M. Rohane IFS, Principal, CASFOS Burnihat and Dr. L.C. Bandana IFS, Lecturer of the Academy. The Course Director of the training, Dr. L.C. Bandana IFS, Lecturer in her opening remarks welcomed the participants and presented an overview of the Academy as well as the Course regarding its aims and objectives, the target groups and the expected outcome of the training programme. Shri Rahul M. Rohane IFS, Principal in his inaugural address emphasized the role of teachers in shaping the future of the country and expressed his belief that this training through sensitization of teachers, particularly in-charge of Eco-Clubs and students would achieve the goal of nature conservation. He further delivered a lecture session on the Mission LiFE (Lifestyle for Environment) and how each one of us can make the smallest changes in our daily lifestyle and can contribute to the global mass movement of Mission LiFE and also took a group pledge of the participants towards adopting a sustainable lifestyle.

Guest Speakers/ Resource persons namely Mr. Jayant Kumar Pathak, Senior Manager, Environment Education Division, Aaranyak; Mr. Nilutpal Mahanta, Senior Project Officer, WWF- India, Dr. Narayan Sharma, Assistant Professor, Cotton University, Guwahati; Ms. Sudeshana Gupta, Science Communicator, Footprint Global Communications; Dr. Alolika Sinha, Conservation Biologist, Aaranyak and Dr. L.C. Bandana, IFS Lecturer CASFOS deliberated on various Environment Conservation related topics in this training programme. The topics covered were Conservation Education/ LiFE, Designing effective Conservation Education Campaign, Conservation Ethos & Human Civilization, Communicating Conservation, Awareness on Conservation Education, Biodiversity Conservation. Besides the Lecture room sessions, the participants were taken to the North East Cane & Bamboo Development Council in the afternoon for three hours on 12<sup>th</sup> December showing the green infrastructural wonders from Cane & Bamboo sector, Bird watching in the morning for two hours on 13<sup>th</sup> December and Nature walk in Pobitora Wildlife Sanctuary post lunch for three hours on 14<sup>th</sup> December, 2023. Dr. C. Ramesh, IFS, Chief Executive Officer cum Member Secretary, State Medicinal Plants Board, Government of Assam was the Chief guest in the Valedictory session and handed over the Certificate of Completion to the participants. In his valedictory speech, he emphasized and urged the teachers and students to observe their immediate natural surrounding including flora, fauna and water bodies since the root cause of environmental degradation is man's loss of sight and connection with nature. He further emphasized that Eco clubs not only have impact on students in their schools, peers but also on the parents and the neighborhood. The detailed time table showing session-wise topics and Resource Persons is enclosed as **Annexure-4**.

A total of 46 teachers & Students from 02 states (Assam & Meghalaya) registered for the training out of which 41 participants (20 teachers & 21 Students) participated in the training programme of which 28 were female and 13 male. The training programme was overwhelmingly appreciated by the participants who also requested for more of such training programmes regularly for keeping up the momentum of environment conservation ideas. They also requested for such sessions if possible at their schools or colleges for maximum participation of all students & teachers. The soft copies of the presentations made by the experts in each session were provided to each participant as part of the training kit/ material in a pen drive.

9.1	Course Content and Structure (CCS)	Course Content & Structure have been highly appreciated by participants with <b>91.16%</b> rating. Participants agreed that the Course aim was met to their full satisfaction & rated it 95.12%. There was increase in knowledge level of the participants as assessed with 89.63% rating. The content of the course and reading material were found to be relevant and the participants highly appreciated it by rating of 92.07% and 87.80% respectively.
9.2	Training Faculty (TF)	The participants have overall rated the training faculty at <b>92.73%</b> . Training faculty and their lectures were highly appreciated by the participants by rating the Contents of their deliberations, Presentation skill, Quality of discussion/interaction and the extent in meeting the objectives at 91.72%, 92.01%, 91.37% and 91.38% respectively. The Field visits were also appreciated and rated at 93.74%.
9.3	Usefulness of the course (UOC)	The participants have given overall feedback that the training course will be highly useful to them by rating <b>85.68%</b> . As per them, it will be highly useful immediately and in future for their job with ratings of 85.98% and 85.37% respectively.

Food quality has been appreciated with no complaints and the participants rated it as 95.24%, Most of the participants have commented that the Course have been organized well with proper time management 96.50% and the Classroom/ Conference room facility were also rated as 96.83%.

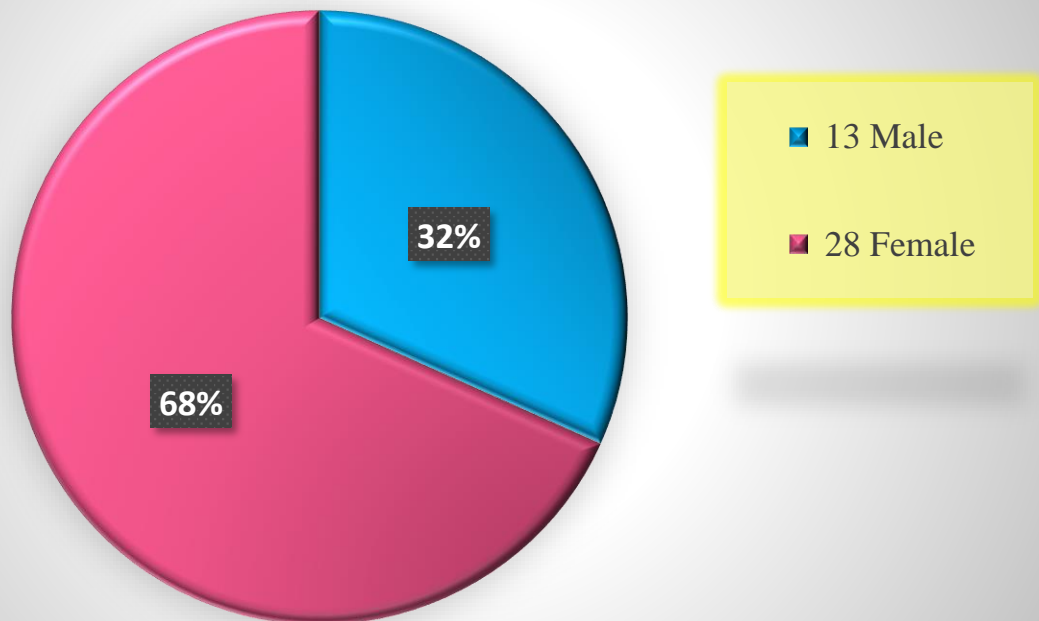

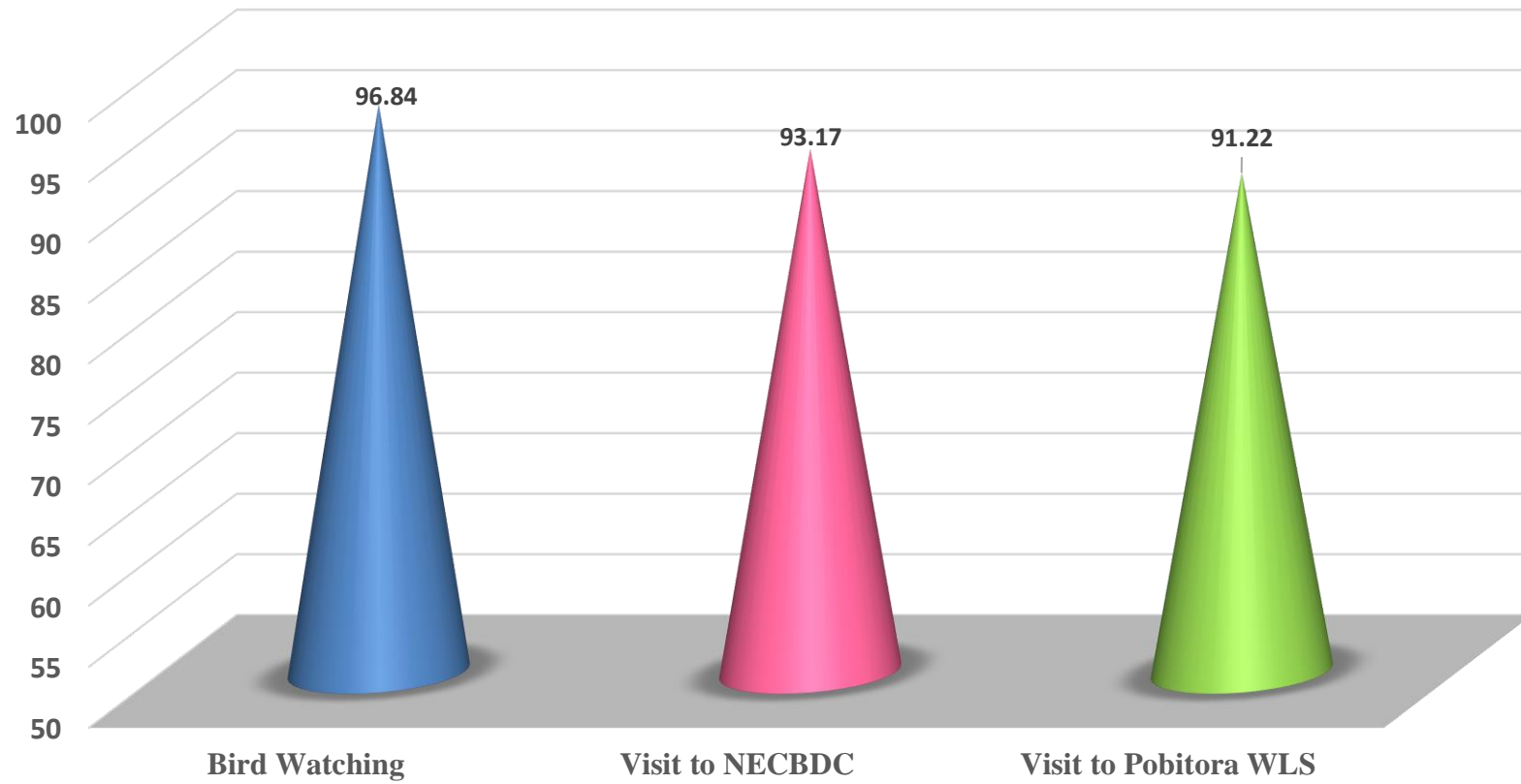
PARAMETER WISE FEEDBACK OF RESOURCE PERSONS
