## **Executive Summary**

As part of its mandate to conduct theme-based in-service training workshops for serving State Forest Service officers from various State Forest Departments, Central Academy for State Forest Service, (CASFOS) Dehradun organized a five-and-a-half-day online training on 'Wildlife Management' from 19<sup>th</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> September 2022. The training was organized through an online platform. A total of 37 registrations were received from Fourteen States and 34 Officers participated in the training while few could not attend the training altogether.

The Wildlife Management module was developed with the experts' input on the subject and feedback from earlier courses and in-house experience. The methodology followed was online training through the Microsoft Teams platform wherein the participants were registered online through a registration form. Thereafter, all the registered participants were given a link to join the training sessions.

The training course started with the inauguration on the first day. The Course Director of the training, Mrs. Abharna.K.M, IFS, Lecturer, CASFOS gave a brief presentation about the course during the Inaugural session on Day 1 of the workshop. Followed by Ms. Meenakshi Joshi, IFS, Principal, CASFOS, Dehradun who was the Chief Guest of the programme addressed the Participants. The Chief Guest gave thrust and stressed upon the challenges that are faced by the Forest Department personnel on the ground when it comes to Human-Wildlife Negative Interaction, Development vs Conservation, and new initiatives taken by the Government of India to mitigate wildlife accidents in road projects. She also emphasized the importance of updating the knowledge on these aspects and the applications of new technologies in wildlife management.

Followed by the Interview of Dr. S.P.Yadav, Addl. Director General Forest (Project Cheetah), MoEF & CC on cheetah Introduction was played to the audience as the cheetah was introduced in India a day before the training.

The important topics on which elaboration and discussion were carried out during the training programme are the Wildlife Crime Scenario in India, Human Tiger conflict-Chandrapur case study, Snow leopard Conservation, Green Infrastructure in development projects, Human- Leopard Interface, Habitat Management, Use of technology in wildlife management, Wildlife corridors, threats delineation legal protection, Rescue and Release of Carnivores, Legal aspects of Human- Wildlife Negative Interface, Rehabilitation- a successful tool in tiger conservation or Tiger Safari, Mob Management in Melghat- A case study, and

Media Management During Human-wildlife Negative Interaction (Panel Discussion). Panel Discussion, Legal Aspects of Human-Wildlife Negative Interface, and Mob Management are the first of its kind sessions that were organized. All sessions were very well appreciated by the participants.

Key speakers in this training course were Mr. Yogesh Nilkanth Warkad, IFS, WCCB Maharashtra, Mr. Prashant Deshmukh, Wildlife Conservation Trust, Maharashtra, Mr. Ajay Bijoor, Assistant Program Director, High Altitude, NCF, Ms. Deepshikha Sharma, Programme Coordinator, High Altitudes, NCF, Ms. Akansha Saxena, Project Scientist Wildlife Institute of India, Dehradun, Mr. Nikit Surve, Master of Science (Wildlife Science) Wildlife Conservation Society- India, Mr. R. K. Wankhede, CCF, Pune, Maharashtra, Dr. K. Ramesh, Scientist – E, Wildlife Institute of India Dehradun, Mr. Hemant Kamdi, (AIGF) NTCA, Nagpur, Regional Office, Dr. Amit Dhyani, Veterinary Officer, Haridwar Forest Department, Dr. Jitendra Ramgaonkar, IFS Conservator of Forests & Field Director Tadoba-Andhari Tiger Reserve, Maharashtra, Dr. T. Beula Ezhilmati, IFS, Lecturer CASFOS Dehradun & Mr. Kedar Dutt, Senior Reporter, Dainik Jagran, Dehradun.

During the valedictory session participants also gave their verbal feedback regarding the course. The course was highly appreciated, and they felt that such training should be held more frequently and in offline mode whenever possible.

The copies of the presentations made by the experts in each session and recordings of the sessions were also provided to each trainee as part of the training kit which was shared through Microsoft SharePoint.

The overall impact of the training was positive and the feedback and high rating from the participants corroborates the assessment of the organizers.



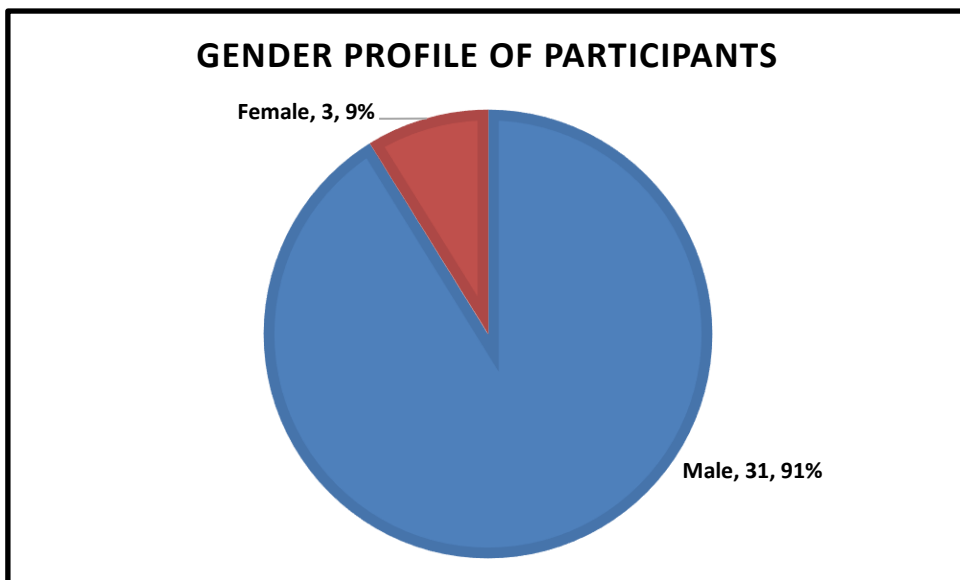
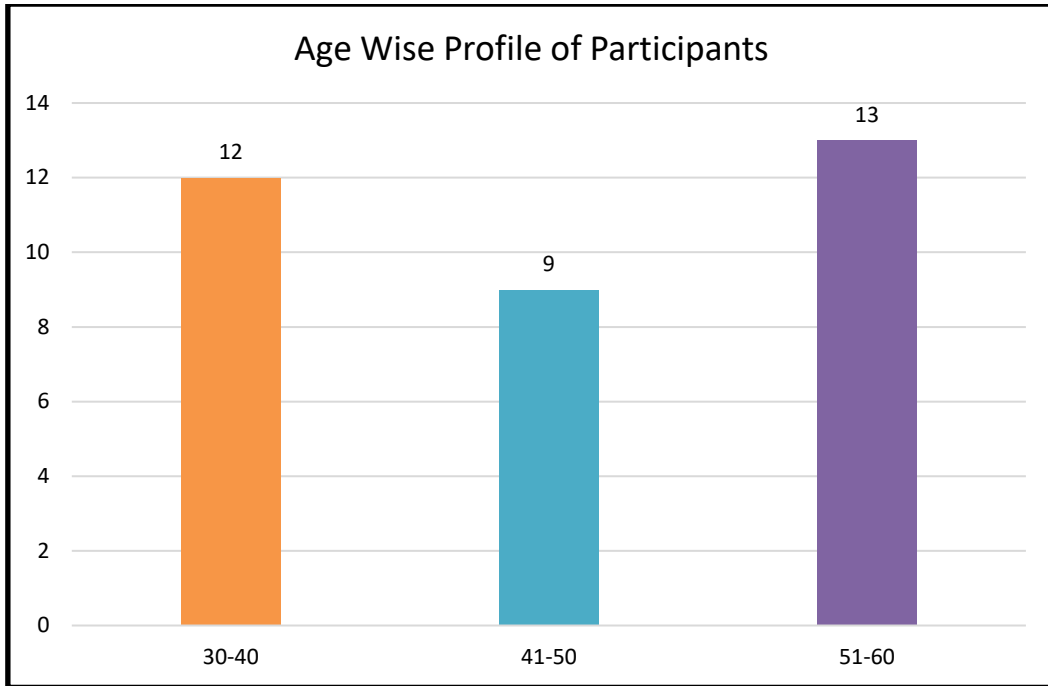


**Overall Feedback of Resource Persons**

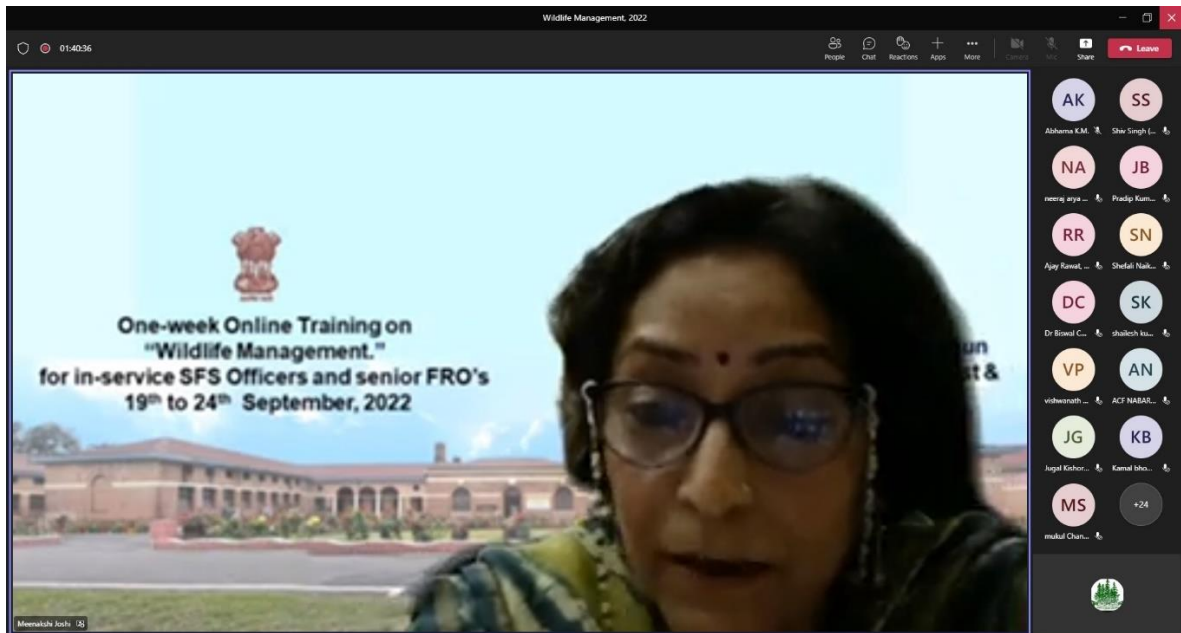


Parameter wise breakup of feedback of Resource Person

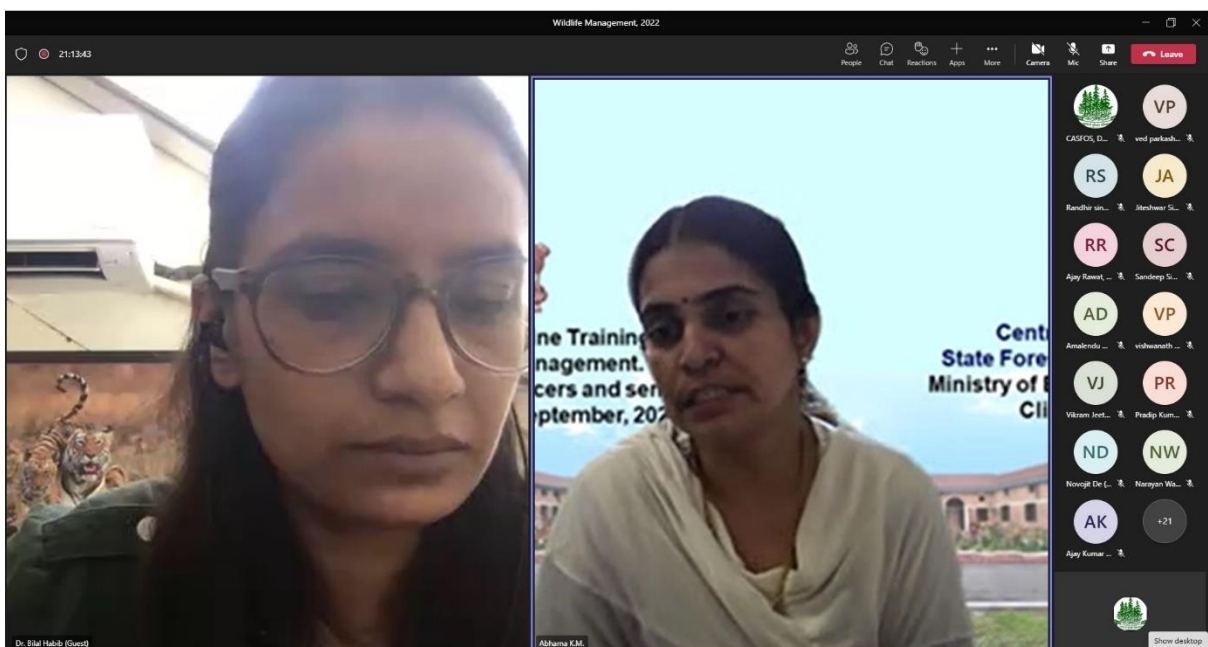

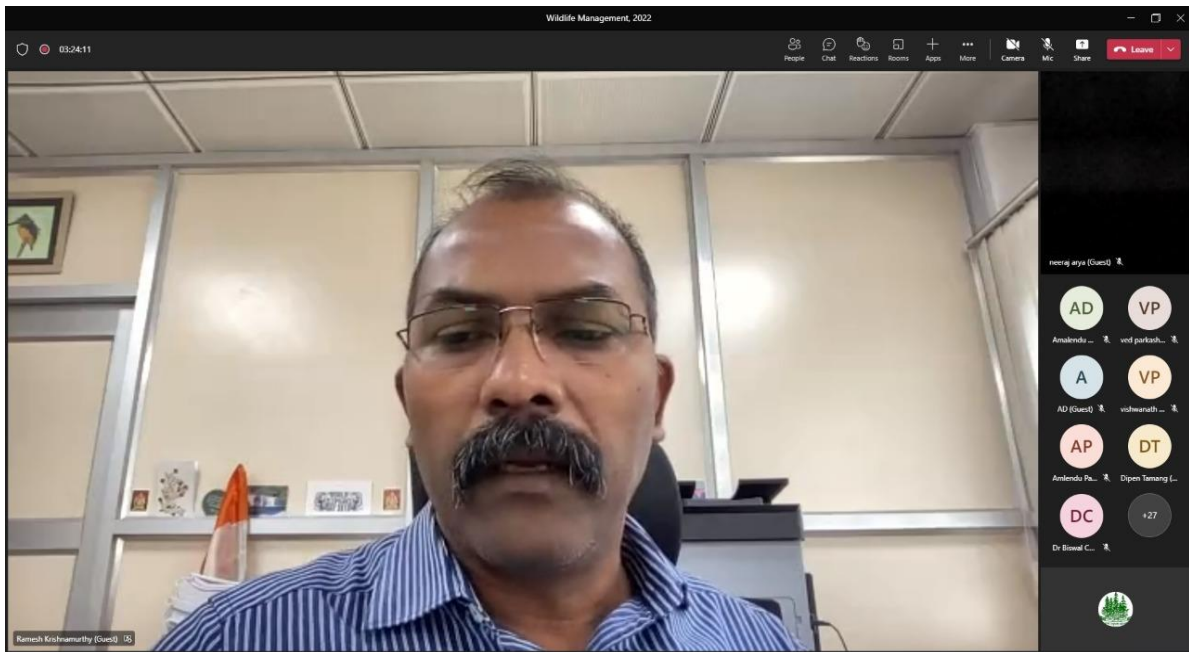

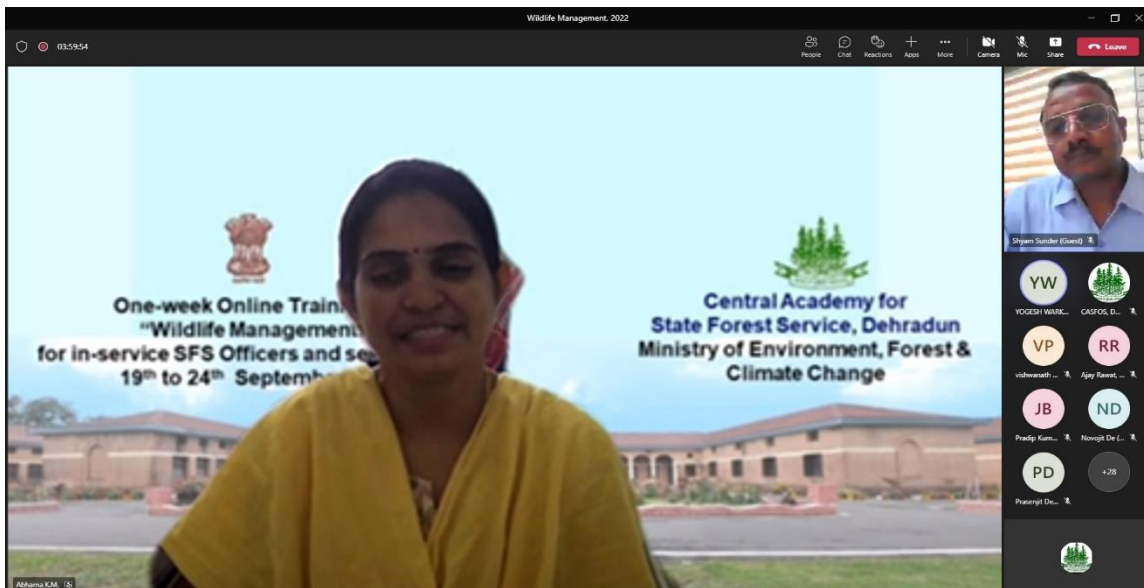
